Health and Safety Policy

South Cave Junior Football Club is committed to providing a safe working, coaching and playing environment for all people. Responsibility for health and safety ultimately lies with the club, however, all users of the club facilities have a legal responsibility, as defined by the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974, to do everything practicable to prevent an accident or injury to themselves and others.

South Cave Junior Football Club promotes health and safety, so far as reasonably practicable, by ensuring:

- The provision and maintenance of safe equipment that poses no risk to health
- The provision of relevant information to candidates, personnel and any related third parties, including instruction, training and supervision, as is necessary to ensure health and safety
- Maintenance of safe environments, including a means of access in a condition that is safe and without risk to health
- Progressive identification and assessment of all risk, taking measures to eliminate or control it
- compliance with statutory regulation on health and safety and welfare of candidates, personnel and any related third parties
- All required, and appropriately qualified members of personnel are given training to identify and control potentially hazardous situations/environments
- Effective measures, such as fire alarms, are in place to deal with emergencies.

This list is not exhaustive and represents general principles in respect of health and safety.

First Aid

The nominated/appointed individuals(s) are:
The club has a number of FA qualified first aiders. Each team has a suitably qualified person and basic medical kit to effectively manage basic first aid type emergencies.
The club has access to an external automatic defibrillator, which is located on the external wall at the pavilion for use in emergencies. This equipment is accessed once the ambulance service has been requested.

All confirmed nominees are appropriately qualified first-aiders, holding current first-aid certificates. Therefore, any team manager / coach must be contacted in the event of an incident occurring, to administer any first aid required. It is important that all issues where a first-aider has been involved are recorded in the necessary incident logbook(s) which accompany the first-aid box(es).

The first aid box(es) are located:
Each team manager has a suitable first aid kit.
A first aid kit is located in the first aid room within the pavilion
